Economic Housing in Portugal – Reading and Analysis of projects from the 1920 through the magazine Architectura Portuguesa

In the beginning of the 20th century, in 1920, it was observed a lack of housing due to the rural exodus of those who are addressing the city in search of work provided by industrialization. The awareness of the increasing population and the housing crisis will find an echo in the architects through the periodic Portuguese press of architecture. These magazines are an instrument considered as a professional diffuser and inducer of forms of thought that maintain the architect updated of technical developments in Portugal and abroad. With the aim to respond to this problem of the working classes, the magazine *Arquitetura Portuguesa* (1908-1929, 1st series) publishes the architects projects and opinion articles that respond to social deficits. Since the architect's social responsibility is reflected in their projects, the study of the published social housing in this magazine, allows to understand the positioning of a professional class, a very recent society, ruled by ethical values and principles, that promotes that everyone has the right to wellbeing and decent and comfortable housing. The presented poster has the aim to understand through the journal how the professional ethics are divulged, focusing on the social responsibility of the architect from the response of the professional practice to the necessities of housing of a working class emerging in the 1920, recognizing, in the works published, the instruments at their disposal to build a country with a greater modernity where an idea of sanitation and hygiene was associated.

INTERNET ACCESS GUIDE

 - b. Security: None or No Authentication (Open)
 - c. Select: Start this connection automatically
 - d. Select: Connect even if the network is not broadcasting

Step 2 - Enable Internet Access

Once completed the FWUE network connection, you must open the Internet browser.

The first time you enter FWUE the Internet access is disabled. When trying to access any page will be redirected to the following page:
